# A NOTE FROM LOU BENCARDINO



2013 is a big year for Bencardino Excavating – celebrating our 25th anniversary. It's been a long road with many challenges to overcome through the years, but it's also been exciting and sometimes...even fun.

We started this company at my mom's house back in 1988. The first piece of equipment the company bought was a Case 580 backhoe. Back then, they cost \$41K to purchase new, so that was a huge investment made to the business at the time, but a good one. It wasn't an ideal time to start a business as the country was going through a recession and the construction industry was especially slow, however, we were determined to see every job through to completion no matter what – just like we do today at Bencardino Excavating.

In 1995, we built our first shop on just a couple of acres. It was a place to keep machinery and had a little office, but nothing fancy. In the meantime, we put an addition on mom's house and worked out of there in a make-shift office until 2000 when the company purchased the acreage next to the shop and built our office which still stands today.

Now we have a small complex here in Bensalem along with about 50 full-time employees, some of whom have been with us since those first few years and others who have joined along the way – and without all of them, Bencardino Excavating would not be thriving.

We are proud of this company along with what we've built. We are also very thankful for all the support that we've gotten along the way.
